The Pensacola Catholic High School Robotics Team, affectionately called 'Crubotics', took first place in this year's Gulf Coast Regional competition in the MATE (Marine Advanced

Technology Education) underwater robotics event. Teams from across the region competed to build and then execute maneuvers using a Remotely Operated Vehicle underwater to move several obstacles, retrieve samples, and identify a simulated shipwreck. This was the first year that CHS competed in this regional competition and won in the Ranger Division. The team has earned an invitation to the MATE International Competition that will be held in Long Beach, CA in June. Congratulations to the team and Mrs. Dana Lupton, Science Teacher and Moderator of the Crubotics Team!

MATH TEAM "ROCKS" COMPETITIONS

Eight Catholic High Junior and Senior students (pictured on the front cover, bottom/right) took highest honors in the Northwest Florida State College Math Bowl held on Friday, March 4. Nine teams competed overall with four teams in the same classification as Catholic High School based on school size. The competition began with all students completing a 45-question, multiple choice exam within 90 minutes. The composition of the test includes 20 algebra questions, 10 geometry questions, 10 trigonometry questions, and 5 miscellaneous questions covering the areas of probability, statistics, logic, and calculus. The four highest scores by participants from each school constitutes the team score for that school for the written component of the competition. The second component of the competition consists of ciphering matches that require team members working in pairs to solve problems using a team approach in a race against time. Twenty points are earned if the team gets the correct answer within the first minute, and ten points are earned if the correct answer is found during the second minute. The Catholic High Math Team won



first in their division and first overall! Catholic High's Team Members were: Seniors - Thomas Cook, Maggie Johnson, Lauren Lacour, Clare Reilly, Emily Watson, and Juniors - Elizabeth Owens, Tyler Ruble, and Quentin Wright. The following CHS Crusaders earned individual honors based on the written exam component of the competition: Tyler Ruble (1st place), Elizabeth Owens (2nd place), and Quentin Wright (5th place). Congratulations, CHS Math Bowl Team!

On Friday, April 1, the Catholic High Math Team competed in the 48th Annual Nicolas S. Walker Math Tournament hosted by Milton High School. Eleven teams from the tri-county area completed math problems in Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, Pre-Calculus, and Calculus as part of Ciphering Matches to earn points for their team. The top three teams in each discipline were awarded prizes along with the overall winner. Pensacola Catholic High School once again earned 1st Overall, scoring a total of 111 points. This marks the 13th year that CHS has won the top honors at this tournament. CHS also took 1st Place in the Algebra I and Algebra II categories, as well as 2nd Place in the Geometry and Pre-Calculus events. INTERNATIONALLY RENOWNED SPEAKER VISITS CATHOLIC HIGH



On Friday, March 4, world-renowned author and motivational speaker, Immaculee Ilibagiza, shared her story with the Pensacola Catholic High School faculty and student body. She, along with seven other women, spent three months huddled together in a three-byfour foot bathroom of a local pastor's home during the 1994 Rwandan genocide. She survived and now shares her story with others. CHS Principal, Sister Kierstin Martin, learned of Immaculee's visit to Pensacola to lead a retreat at St. Paul's Parish on Hyde Park Road. Sister Kierstin was offered the blessing of having Immaculee visit Catholic High to speak to the faculty and students during her time in Pensacola and Immaculee happily accepted the invitation.

Immaculee began her story by confessing that it is all too often easy to complain in our circumstances. She shared that when the genocide began in Rwanda, her father gave her

his favorite rosary and begged her to go to their neighbor and friend's home, a pastor and member of the favored Hutu tribe who was willing to hide her from the Hutu soldiers. She remembered complaining to herself about how small the room was and that she hoped the conflict would be over in a few days. She went on to share that over the next three days a total of seven other women ranging in age from 7 to 55 joined her in that bathroom in hopes of surviving the ordeal. She never had it so good when she was the only person in the small room! They took turns sitting on each other's laps and sharing what food the pastor could sneak to them. She and the other women prayed often and clung to the belief that they were all special and wonderfully loved by God. Immaculee shared some of the feelings and pain she experienced during her time in that room, not knowing if they would be found.

She spoke about emerging from the room after 91 days to discover that her parents and both of her brothers had been killed, and the self-questioning as to why she had been spared. She talked about the journey to forgive those who had killed her family and the fact that is was only through the grace of God that she was able to do it. She encouraged all of the students to seek God, to know His love, and to love others in return. She said, "the love of a single heart can make a world of difference." And it can start with you, all of us! Catholic High School was so blessed to have had a personal visit from Immaculee!

Immaculee's book, Left to Tell - Discovering God Amidst the Rwandan Holocaust, is a New York Times Best Seller in which she shares her entire experience and message of healing and love.

CHS 'MAKES A DIFFERENCE' IN 27TH ANNUAL EVENT







On March 5 approximately 350 students and parent volunteers from Pensacola Catholic High School gathered for the school's 27th annual Make a Difference Day project. The event began at 7:15 a.m. at the Nickelsen Family Courtyard on



the CHS campus where students checked in with their project leaders and met up with friends in their assigned projects. Rita Lay, CHS Director of Advancement and coordinator of the event, officially welcomed students and volunteers and then conducted a safety briefing to remind students and volunteers alike to be conscious of their surroundings and tasks as they go about the work of their projects. Principal, Sister Kierstin Martin, then lead a prayer service in thanksgiving for all the wonderful volunteers, the work of the

organizations that were to be serviced during the projects, and for the beautiful weather God had sent! Students were then released into the community to partake in 25 different service projects to "Make a Difference."

Project work included clean-up and landscaping efforts in three separate cemeteries; painting, cleaning, and refurbishing at three local schools and four church parishes. Teams also served non-

profit organizations including the Alpha Center, Ascension Miracle Camp, Martha's Vineyard, Rosewood Manor, Waterfront Mission, Majella House, and other locations to 'Make a Difference'. The Green Club participated as a collective team to help plant sea grass along the bay in Milton to help preserve the shoreline and ward off future erosion. Another team used the school's kitchen to cook three different meals for the Ronald McDonald House guests. Students and parent volunteers worked on their projects until Noon before returning to the Tolan Family Student Life Center for a lunch that was also prepared by a team.

Make a Difference Day, also called MADD around campus, began at Catholic High in 1996 when former Development Director, Jane Moseley, first spearheaded CHS joining a national movement, originally sponsored by Gannett Publishing, that was held on the third Saturday of October every year. The national movement discontinued a few years ago, but Catholic High continued the tradition in support of our Core Values – Selfless Love, Commitment to Excellence, Personal Integrity, and Commitment to Service.




FRIENDS FOR LIFE

Recently members of the Class of 1958 invited Sister Kierstin Martin and Rita Lay, Director of Advancement, to a luncheon at the Pensacola Yacht Club. Several members of the class traveled from out of town to attend the special occasion. After a delicious lunch was served the group presented Sister Kierstin with a gift that the group had been custodians of since 1988 – a scale model of the original Pensacola Catholic High School that was located on the corner of Garden and Baylen Streets in Downtown Pensacola. A fitting gift for the 80th Birthday of Catholic High!

Not much is known about the origin of the model – Who made it? How old is it? Was there a purpose for the model? Here is what we do know – When "The Class of CHS", which they

affectionately like to call them-

Allen Bizzell, who served as the Master of Ceremonies at the luncheon, said "The school model has served as a "magic time machine" for those who attended the school as it sparks vivid memories of the wonderful years spent there." The building was previously an Elk's Lodge before being used as a school. There is evidence in pictures of an elk bust above the door that flanked the Baylen Street entrance. The entrance with the Cross flanked Garden Street, and classmates remember, was rarely used. The entrances at the back of the building with the parking lot and asphalt basketball court were the most used entrances. The Chapel was located on the second floor in the location behind the cross, and the two-story wing to the left held the cafeteria on the first floor and the Auditorium on the second floor.

Classmates at the luncheon also shared some interesting stories about some of the memories held in the model classrooms — in the third-floor classroom, top right, classmate Charlie Williams almost killed them all because he forgot to turn the gas off following a chemistry experiment. Oh, and if viewing from the back, a few of the unnamed classmates remember spending some time in the office on the first floor, left middle window—the Principal's Office!



During the time spent sharing at the luncheon, classmates also reminisced about the good education and values they were taught while they



were there. Allen said, "We entered as carefree teenagers but emerged four years later with an education set of values that enabled us to be responsible and successful in what turned out to be a warp-speed world." Fred Donovan, who hosted the group at the Yacht club, recalled that the Faculty and Staff had a way of guiding the students that was invaluable. He distinctly remembered a meeting with Sister Consuella when at the time, he was considering going to either Notre Dame or Georgia Tech. She told him, "you are good at math and physics so you need to be an engineer!" That meeting shaped his decision to attend Georgia Tech and the career/business he ultimately pursued. Robin Bosso Bellan, who is known by the group as the "glue" that keeps them together said, "We formed lasting relationships with one another and we are still good friends." The classmates that live in the Pensacola area get together for lunch on a regular basis at least once a month. A BIG THANK you to the Class of 1958 for passing on this piece of Catholic High history for all of us to see. To date, 33 exemplary alumni have been inducted into the Hall of Fame for their embodiment of the CHS Core Values of Commitment to Excellence, Commitment to Service, Personal Integrity, and Selfless Love and for their generosity, commitment, and loyalty to Catholic High. Since the Spring of 2020, the Alumni Committee has attempted to induct the 33rd honoree but because of COVID-19 and repeated scheduling challenges, it did not

officially happen until the Committee surprised this alumnus at his work

place on March 9.

Congratulations to 1987 graduate Peter Mougey. While at CHS, Peter was active in a number of extracurricular activities-both athletic teams and other service/interest clubs. He was an accomplished swimmer for all four years on the CHS Swim Team as well as a varsity Basketball player and Track Team member. 


