


# Continuing to Build on Faith, Family & Tradition

### Fr. John Licari '72 Goes from 'Pinball Wizard' to the Priesthood

In the Fall of 1997, the CHS Alumni Committee launched a new initiative, the Catholic High Alumni Hall of Fame to honor Crusader alumni who stand out among the more than 8,900 graduates of Catholic High. To date, 32 exemplary alumni have been inducted into the Alumni Hall of Fame. These graduates, ranging in graduation years from 1941 to 1993, have been selected for their embodiment of the CHS Core Values of Commitment to Excellence, Commitment to Service, Personal Integrity, and Selfess Love and for their generosity, commitment, and loyalty to Catholic High. On Finday, March 15, yet another outstanding CHS alumni was inducted into the Catholic High Alumni Hall of Fame—Fr. John Licari, a member of the Class of 1972.

Born in the Bronx, N.Y. in 1954, our honoree moved to Pensacola in 1967, the year of Sgt. Pepper! He began playing the guitar in the mid '60s—mostly music by the Beatles and the Rolling Stones. Fr. Licari began performing professionally while in high school with a five member band called Lyman Stack. By 1973 the band broke up and our honoree followed the solo path, spending more time writing songs. This led to a move to Atlanta in 1978 to try his talents in a new town. About that time. Bob Dylan, already a rock-n-roll legend, released 'Slow Train Coming' a spiritual album that mirrored Dylan's recent conversion to Christianity. In this album, Fr. Licari had a blueprint, He could rock. He could roll. And do it all in Jesus' name. 'Peach of Soul' by the late Archbishop Fulton Sheen struck our inductee as it talked about the Catholic Sacrament of Reconciliation, which our honoree had avoided for years. Suddenly a lot of things about the Catholic faith began to make sense. Fr. Licari began volunteering his musical talents at the Transfiguration Catholic Church where he worked with shut-ins and also in Atlanta's soup kitchens. It was here that his faith began to grow.



In 1979 Bob Dylan came out with an album that was sort of 'Gospel-flavored'. It showed Fr. Licari he could write music about how the Lord had affected his life.

As a result two prayerful songs were written.—Man on the Cross' and 'I want to give my life to You' that were played everywhere Fr. Licari performed. Through
the early 1980's our inductee's spirituality and faith deepened to the extent he even questioned whether he was being called to the priesthood. Although he recognized this call, he was affaid to take a step away from the musical career that he loved.

In 1985 Fr. Licari moved back to Pensacola. He began performing in Pensacola clubs again but this time around he mixed his own spiritually-based songs into the act. He'd go from 'Pinball Wizard' to 'Man on the Cross.' He was active in mission activities through St. Anne Penish in Gulf Breeze. It was on a mission trip in Chimbote. Peru that Fr. Licari met Rev. Jack Davis, a man who would influence him in his decision to become a priest. Ever since his spiritual awakening in Atlanta, he realized he was being called to the priesthood but he just wasn't ready. So in 1993 Fr. Licari decided to get a degree in special education. It was that year that he called his sister Aida and said he had some news for her. Her question was, "What, are you going to get married?" to which he responded 'sorta."

In 1997 Fr. Licari entered Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans where he graduated with a Master's Degree in Divinity in May 2002. While holding on to his love of music, he soon traded the harmonica, acoustic guitar, keyboards, and vocals to studying theology at the seminary. However, his spiritual advisor thought he was distancing himself too much from music and encouraged Fr. Licari to use his gift of music for God's glory.

Fr. Lican's devotion to God and the Catholic Church was celebrated May 18, 2001, at the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart when he was ordained as a deacon, the final step before priesthood. His 27-year career as a singer/ songwriter had led him to the priesthood and it was on June 28, 2002, that Fr. John Lican was ordained a priest by Bishop John Ricard.

Since being ordained, Fr. Lican's positions in the Diocese have included serving as. Parochial Vicar at St. Mary Catholic Church, Ft. Walton Beach, Parochial Vicar at Nativity of Our Lord, Administrator at St. Anne Beliview, St. Mary Panish, FWB, St. John the Evangelist Church in Pensacola and from January 1, 2018, to present, Fr. Lican serves as Pastor of St. John Parish in Pensacola. Although he's still a fan of rock and roil, Father Lican's current 'gigs' more include ecumenical gatherings along with ongoing performances at the Saufley Field Prison, the Rangers at Hurlburt Field, Blessing of the Ships, and concerts for miscellaneous local fundraisers and, of course, joining other Catholic High alumni priests every year at the Spring Mass and Fish Fry at Catholic High.

It is with a great deal of pride that we honor our newest member of the Catholic High Alumni Hall of Fame, a member of the Class of 1972, the curty-haired explosion of energy and a true friend of Catholic High, Fr. John Licari.












# CHS Annual Campaign--For it is in Giving that we Receive

Our annual campaign's contributions to Pensacola Catholic High continue to make a significant difference to the accomplishments and improvements made over the years. Gifts received are a reflection of the efforts and enthusiasm of the entire Catholic High community. To each of our donors, on behalf of the rich heritage that has spanned more than seventy-six years, and the confidence of a bright and secure future. Catholic High conveys our heartfelt thanks for your continued support as CHS continues to develop citizens of tomorrow—spiritually, mentally, physically, and socially.

To date over \$360,000 has been received from over 300 donors in support of our 2018-2019 Gift-Giving Campaign. Catholic High offers many opportunities for you to play a part in helping provide a value-based education to high school students in Northwest Florida. The possibilities for participation are diverse:

Testamentary Bequests – Why not include in your Will or trust document a provision making a bequest of property to CHS? A simple bequest of cash or other property from an estate or trust can greatly benefit future academics and other worthwhile programs at CHS, while also reducing potential estate tax liabilities and administrative costs.

Charitable Remainder Trusts - This type trust allows an immediate income tax deduction for a portion of a bequest, avoids the potential of capital gains tax, ensures income for one's lifetime or a set term, and provides for the remainder of the assets to pass to Catholic High at the death of the donor.

Life Insurance -Catholic High can be named as the beneficiary of a life insurance policy. The payment of insurance premiums is a relatively inexpensive way to make a large bequest of either the face amount of the insurance policy or a designated smaller percentage. Income and/or estate tax benefits could result.

Retirement Plan Gifts - Consider naming Catholic High as a full or partial beneficiary of your IRA, 401K or whatever retirement plan you have. There will be no income tax to CHS and the school only receives funds you haven't used while alive. This can be an easy gift to accomplish that makes a

real difference to the Catholic High. Or, consider a gift of part or all of your annual required distribution. Up to \$100,000 can be gifted this way with tax savings in almost every case.

Memorial Gifts - Make a gift to Catholic High to honor someone else living or deceased. These gifts are deductible for income tax purposes now. Your gift can be restricted -- that is, designated for specific purposes-- or, if you leave it unrestricted, it will help fund the general needs of the school.

Matching Gifts - Many employers have a matching gift program, which is designed to encourage employees and retirees to make gifts to non-profit entities such as CHS. Contact your employer for details of such a program.
